Hello and Happy Holidays!



Heartworm

Heartworm Disease is a very serious and potentially fatal condition caused by worms living in the lungs and hearts of dogs, cats and other species of mammals. Dogs and cats of any age are susceptible to infection. They are infected with the disease through the bite of a mosquito. A mosquito can spread infected larvae to an animal through its bite wound. Once bitten, it takes 6-7 months for the infective larvae to mature into adult heartworms. Adult heartworms can grow to be a foot long! This giant parasite can cause inflammation in blood vessels, clots in the lungs, heart failure, liver failure, kidney failure, and ultimately death. AHS takes in and treats, on average, 170 heartworm cases per year. We are currently treating 8 dogs that have been infected with heartworm. The cost of treatment is between 400-800 dollars per dog! Due to the high cost of treatment, most shelters won't even consider accepting a Heartwormpositive dog, so many are stuck in high-kill shelters. Please help us to raise money so that we can continue to save heartworm-positive dogs who would otherwise be euthanized. We believe their lives are worth saving!

Hoarding

Animal House Shelter is partnered with Animal Rescue Corps. Together we help to rehabilitate and find homes for animals that have often come from awful situations. Below are a few recent rescues.

Operation Dead End

On September 3rd, Animal Rescue Corps rescued 29 dogs and 4 cats from deplorable conditions in Hardeman County Tennessee. The animals were found running loose inside and outside a decaying trailer. The trailer was soaked in urine and feces to the point the floor was rotting away. The cats were kept in small maggot-filled crates. When help arrived, the animals were extremely weak and were suffering from a wide range of medical issues including broken bones, dehydration, malnourishment, severe anemia, high ammonia exposure, mange, dental disease, overgrown nails, loss of fur, skin inflammation, infections and parasites.





Operation Out of the Dark

On September 4th, Animal Rescue Corps rescued 9 surviving dogs from desperate conditions in Henderson, Tennessee. When Animal Rescue Corps arrived on the scene, 9 dogs were running loose through the property. The owners stated they had moved out several years ago but had been slipping food and water through the door. The house was completely boarded up and there were no lights or electricity. Officials said the feces was over a foot deep, combined with trash and bones. There were mother dogs who had recently given birth but not a single living puppy. These dogs too were struggling with many health and emotional issues.

Medical Donations Needed

Cooper doesn't let his disabilities get him down

Cooper came to AHS when he was only 8 months old. This sweet and resilient boy arrived not only blind, but with a double ear infection. Cooper went in to see one of our veterinarians who then started him on antibiotics to treat the infection. The infection resolved in the left ear, however, the right ear remained sensitive and had yellow



discharge. Cooper was sent to a specialist who discovered a growth/polyp in the right ear canal. The specialist recommended surgically removing the polyp. Without removal, it was unlikely his ear infection would ever resolve. Cooper is out of surgery and doing well. His infection is gone and he is enjoying his new forever family. Cooper's surgery totaled \$2,200.

Can you help?

Merlin's Surgery

Merlin arrived at AHS in August from a high-kill shelter in southern Illinois. Upon arrival, Merlin tested positive for heartworm disease. He would need to undergo vigorous treatment to flush his body of the heartworm. In addition to testing positive for heartworm, he also was limping on his right hind leg. Our veterinarian determined Merlin's hip was injured by some type of blunt force



trauma. The best course of action would be for Merlin to have FHO (hip replacement) surgery. First, Merlin was placed into a loving foster home where he would undergo his heartworm treatment. Now that his heartworm treatment is complete, Merlin is finally able to get his FHO surgery. This surgery will give Merlin the chance to walk and play pain free! Merlin's care totaled over \$2300. Please donate to help cover this sweet boy's medical expenses!

Meet DeeDee!

She is an American Staffordshire Terrier/Plott Hound and she is 5 years old.

Deedee came to AHS from a high-kill shelter in Tennessee in March 2022. Upon arrival, Deedee was limping on her right rear leg. She was immediately sent to one of our veterinarians for a full examination and x-rays. The doctor informed us that Deedee had a grade 3/4 luxating patella and a chronic dislocated right hip. Deedee needed FHO surgery as well as





surgery to fix her knee. First, she had the FHO surgery and once healed, they went back in to fix her luxating patella.

Now DeeDee is healed and enjoying her life pain free! She loves to run, sometimes she will even have the "zoomies". DeeDee knows "sit" and keeps her kennel clean at the shelter. She loves to play, wouldn't you love to play with me. She is super playful and affectionate. She is sometimes shy at first when meeting people but she warms up quickly and loves to give kisses! Both surgeries totaled \$3700.
